The Elusive and Rare 1974 GTO By Chris Winslow





In this year where we have celebrated the 50th anniversary of the 1964 GTO, the 40th anniversary of the 1974 GTO, and the 10th anniversary of the 2004 GTO we have run multiple articles on cars from these years. For the 1964, we have run articles on some great cars, including two that were used by model companies to make 1964 GTO models. The 2004 GTO owners in the club have also stepped up with some great articles. One of these articles was recently re-run in *The Legend*.

The one article missing from the pages of *The Hoodscoop* for this anniversary year is one on the 1974 GTO. The 1974 is indeed a very rare model. Pontiac officially canceled it mid year in 1974 and based on their published totals, only 7058 of the cars were produced (1723 hatchbacks and 5335 coupes).

The 1974 GTO was an option on the 1974 Pontiac Ventura. The Ventura itself was a essentially the Chevrolet Nova adapted with some Pontiac styling cues. The Ventura was an early volley in what would come to be called badge engineering later in the decade. This was also part of an overall move by the US automobile industry towards smaller, safer, more fuel efficient cars in the wake of the double whammy of skyrocketing gas prices and climbing insurance rates. In this case, Pontiac realized that they needed a smaller car and found the chassis they needed over at Chevy in the Nova. Pontiac's sister divisions Oldsmobile and Buick also followed suit in this trend, Oldsmobile with the Omega and Buick with the Apollo.

Styling wise it is arguable that Pontiac did the best job adapting the Nova platform to their genre with the GTO option. They put on a front grill reminiscent of the 1965 GTO, albeit it with a single head light on each side as opposed to the stack headlight pairs from the 1965.


Under the hood, Pontiac fitted the 200 net HP 350V8. This was a direct contradiction to John DeLorean's promise from 1968 that "I will never allow a GTO to have anything less than 400 cubic inches" but it reflected the reality of the times and the dramatic changes that were underway in the automobile market. Many Pontiac enthusiasts were disappointed with the engine choice, hoping instead for the 455 Super Duty from the Trans Am. Unfortunately, that coupling was not to happen, at least not from the factory.

The 1974 did have a rear facing shaker hood scoop. The hoodscoop was in keeping with all previous incarnations of the GTO (if not all subsequent ones!). In addition, it came with GTO decals on the grille, fenders, and rear decklid, Rally II wheels without trim rings, E70x14 tires, dual exhaust, front and rear stabilizer bars, outside sport mirrors and a

firmer suspension tuning than the Ventura n which it was based. This option added \$461 to the cost of a base Ventura. This brought the cost of most 1974 GTO's to well over \$4500.

The performance of the 1974 GTO was reflective of the 350 V8 engine of that year. That engine, like most from that time frame, was ham strung with a reduced

compression ratio and a number of devices designed to reduce emissions. That, combined with the increased weight of the vehicle as the car companies complied with a variety of government mandated safety requirements (the GTO version of the Ventura weighed in at just over 3700 pounds), resulted in a decrease in performance. Car Craft's test of the 1974 GTO found a 1/4 mile time of 16.14 at 85.87mph. This was actually quite good relative to many of its piers, although it did lag behind one of its direct competitors that year, the Dodge Dart. The Dart, which was both lighter and had a larger and slightly more powerful engine, was clocked at 15.1 seconds in the quarter.





GTO of the Month



Largely because of the lack of demand for muscle cars by 1974, Pontiac shut down production of the GTO option by the middle of the model year. This is despite the fact that by that point the 1974 had already outsold the 1972 (5673 sold) and the 1973 (4312 sold) models. Had Pontiac allowed sales to continue throughout the model year, the car may well have rivaled the production total of the 1971 GTO (10, 532).

Because of the relatively small production run, finding a 1974 GTO in good condi-

tion is rare. There is one such car in our club owned by Rich and Sue Vie. The photos in this article are of Rich's car, a 1974 coupe.

Rich's car represents the end, for a while anyway, of the great run of the GTO. Pontiac had invented and then dominated a new car segment, the muscle car. By 1974, however, the market and the economy had changed and it would be three decades before Pontiac would bring back The Great One.

Getting Started on Facebook

A series of Page options will open up. Choose one of the options displayed; you may want to consider the Cause or Community option. After you select your option, a new dialogue box will open, Tab 1. Type in the name of your chapter (which will be its Facebook name), then click the Get Started button and a new page will open up, Tab 2. This is the About page. Follow the directions. In the dialogue box, type in information about your chapter. (This is to get you started; you can modify your About page once your page is created.)

Gateway GTO Celebrates 30 Years By Will Bowers

Where were you in 1984?

The US Bell System was broken up (for you Tom). In the Reagan Mondale presidential race Reagan takes 49 states and Mondale barely takes his home state of MN. Thriller, Born in the USA and Purple Rain were among the top songs. Terminator, Ghost Busters and Indiana Jones and the Temple of Doom were among the popular movies. In a way, it was the year of the Tiger as Detroit won the World Series beating the Padres. 1984 was also the year that the Pontiac Fiero was introduced. Believe it or not, John De Lorean also played a role in its development. The Fiero based on his prototype Banshee. It was also a good year for John personally, as he was acquitted of 8 charges of possession of cocaine!



While all these events were shaping the world, there was also a small, but intrepid, group of automotive enthusiasts in St. Louis who were about change the course of events for local GTO owners. This was the year that a new chapter of the GTO Association of America was formed. For the next 30 years it would be come to be known as the Gateway GTO Association and would remain in continuous operation through good years and, occasionally, some lean years. Included in this article is a copy of the original petition to GTOAA listing the original seven members requesting chapter membership. Note at the top there is a sketch of our logo that has remained relatively unchanged for 30 years. Interestingly "Association" may not have been part of the first name considered as it was scratched out. Unfortunately, I was unable to determine the other name under consideration.

From here the information gets a little sketchy; however, there was an ad in the St. Louis Post Dispatch classic automotive section announcing a request for interested parties to meet at a Midas Muffler Shop in South County across from Crestwood Plaza (where the big stores used to be). I remember being excited. I couldn't wait to get there to find out what was going on in the GTO world. Somehow in my excitement I locked up the 4 speed in second gear! Fortunately, there were knowledgeable people, and a lift. Allowing me to drive home using all four gears.

The pictures show a few of the cars and people in attendance. The one that stood out the most, to me, was a red '70 with a black top and Ram Air System. I had only read about and had never seen a real Ram Air System before that day. It was owned by this cool dude wearing a base ball








style cap (It may have even had a GTO Logo on it), sporting a goatee and smoking a pipe. This cool dude was later determined to be Tony Bezzole (still a cool dude). Sorry to say I can't identify any of the other cars or people pictured.

Back in the day (before the internet) communication was a real problem for the club. The newsletter was sent by mail and that was our only method for communication. (Of course there were










Since many new and used hood tachometers are surfacing, it is important to have the correct specifications for locating the tachs on the hood. As we cannot present the full size templates in the Newsletter, we have done the next best thing, taking the measurements from them and reproducing them on a smaller scale. These specs should allow you to be able to mount the tach to almost perfect Factory locations.

THE TACHOMETER STEEL




E is 3.50" diameter hole, center of which is 10.0" from left side of hood and 8.125" from rear of hood

A, B, C, and D are .218" diameter holes

A is 7.5" from left side and 7.875" from rear of hood B is 12.188" from left side and 7.50" from rear of hood C is 11.563" from left side and 10.75" from rear D is 8.125" from left side and 11.0" from rear

After cutting hole E with a hole saw and marking the locations of A, B, C, and D lay the tach down and check the locations to ensure all your measurements are correct.



1968-1970

E is 3.50" diameter hole, center of which is 9.75" from left side of hood and 13.125" from back of hood

A, B, and C are .218" diamter holes

A is 7.438" from left side and 12.875" from rear B is 11.875" from left side and 12.375" from rear C is 9.625" from left side and 16.625" from rear

After cutting hole E with a hole saw, check your markings and measurements before drilling the stud holes.

The hood tachs used a thin rubber gasket underneath them from the Factory. This type gasket material is easily obtained in sheet form. You can use this in a 1/32" thickness or a 1/64" thickness if the 1/32" sets the tach too high off of your hood. This gasket will assist in keeping water from getting under the tach and entering the tach where the Factory silicone sealer has deteriorated or is not fully scaling the two halves. In addition, $\underline{\text{Do}}$ Not tighten the nuts too tightly as they will cause $\underline{\text{low}}$ spots in the top of the tach from overtensioning of the plastic.

This year Gateway GTO Association is celebrating its 30th anniversary. As part of the celebration, Brian O'Sullivan did a great job designing an anniversary logo incorporating the original arch design; as well as, our "30 Years of Slammin' Gears" slogan from our 1994 GTOAA Nationals. Also included in this article is a copy of the cover from the convention program. The art of graphics has certainly come a long way.

After 30 years, the club is still going strong and growing. We currently have over 70 members. I am certain we are all looking forward to many more years of fun events, great friendships, and Slammin' Gears!

While the Schedule of Events for 2014's 3rd Annual GTOAA All Pontiac Cruise and Show read very much as it did for the two preceding years, the events themselves were notably different. Hosted by the Gateway, Heart of Illinois and Windy City GTOAA chapters, the Pontiac-Oakland Museum and Resource Center and the City of Pontiac, Illinois, 2014's events brought new perspectives, entertainment, show classes and fun thanks to the hard work of the hosting organizations.

Held on the third weekend of September, Day 1 of this two-day event featured tours of the Pontiac-Oakland, Route 66 and War Museums and since Route 66 runs through Pontiac, each year a cruise on parts of Old 66 is organized to include historic stops, photo -ops, lunch and plenty of scenic driving (see Chris Winslow's 66 Cruise article immediately following for details). Later that afternoon attendees congregated at the main pavilion in the city's Chautauqua Park for a presentation by Bill Porter, Chief Designer of the Pontiac Studio. Bill was the lead designer of the second generation GTO which went into production in 1968 and



carried into the 1972 model year. The 1968 GTO nabbed Motor Trend's Car-Of-The-Year award based on its technical advances in performance, safety and styling. You gotta love the Endura front bumper and the hideaway headlights – arguably making the 1968 GTO the sexiest and most muscular looking vehicle of its era. Bill discussed the whys and wherefores of the new for '68 A-Body's restyling including a PowerPoint presentation of concept drawings, clay models and GM archival photos and data. Bill's presentation was outstanding and more than fascinating to a 1968 GTO owner/lover such as myself.

Immediately following Mr. Porter's presentation was a catered fried chicken and pasta dinner with all the trimmings, an Ice Cream Social and "On The Road Again – Mother Road








That Is", a thoroughly entertaining musical revue performed by Pontiac's Vermillion Players. Day 1 ended with exhausted smiles as everyone retired to their rooms in anticipation of Day 2's Car Show held in and around Pontiac's city square.

There was concern among the organizers as to the turnout for Sunday's car show since we had a 5-10 minute rain sprinkle Saturday afternoon and some violent thunderstorms had tracked through northern Illinois and Indiana overnight. While some potential attendees may have stayed away due to weather concerns, Sunday was dry and mostly sunny and by 10AM there were 200 cars on display in the show field – most in superlative condition. In response to calls for Firedbird/TransAm and Fiero show classes some previous classes were consolidated and new classes created including four Firebird/TransAm classes and a Fiero class – resulting in 17 Trophy Classes, 6 more than 2013's event. GTOs of all years were here in force as were sub-









As one of the lead organizers of this event, I have not heard anything other than praise from attendees at this annual event which benefits the Pontiac-Oakland Museum and Resource Center with the 2014 Event yielding \$3,500 in proceeds for the Museum. Take a look at the photo taken in just one automobile and memorabilia storage area in Chris Winslow's accompanying article and it becomes clear that cataloging, restoring, maintaining and displaying Pontiac-Oakland history is a major undertaking. While everyone filing out of Pontiac late Sunday was smiling let's not lose sight of Tim and Penny Dye's need for the support of we Pontiac-Oakland aficionados for their preservation endeavors.

Finally, kudos are in order to Tim and Penny Dye; GTOAA; the Gateway, Heart of Illinois and Windy City Chapters; Pontiac Mayor Bob Russell; Pontiac Chamber-of-Commerce Event Co-Ordinator Ellie Alexander and the hard-working members of these organizations for staging such an enjoyable event benefitting the preservation of Pontiac – GM's "Excitement Division". Work is already underway for 2015's Event to be held September 19-20 in Pontiac, Illinois – mark your calendar now, DON'T MISS IT.









The Route 66 Cruise by Chris Winslow

One of the best parts of the annual GTOAA regional event in Pontiac is the Route 66 cruise. Each year, a new cruise route is mapped out with new destinations. Our destination was the Standard Oil Station on South West Street. The station is on the National Historic Resister of Historic Places. It was built in 1932 and was in use until it was closed in 1975. It has since been restored by the Illinois Route 66 Association's Preservation Committee.

As we rolled up on the old station we were all taken by how nicely the restoration had been done. It was like traveling back in time to the 1950's.







The local folks on the cruise told us that root beer that they sold in the station was awesome, so we had to try some and they were right. After everyone toured the building and had a few sodas, we were on our way to the next stop.

This time we were headed north on 66 again to Dwight. Our destination was the Oughton House Country Mansion Restaurant for lunch. Like everything else on the cruise, this stop had been planned to the last detail, including the organizers getting our orders before we left Tim's shop so they would be ready for us.

For this part of the cruise, I actually go there first. I had been at the very back of the line and realized that most of the group had taken a right instead of a left, so I took the left and wound up the first car at the parking lot. They had blocked off an entire section of the lot for our cruise, so when we arrived, they waived us right into the designated parking area. The rest of the group was right behind us a few minutes later.

The staff at the Oughton House had prepared the outdoor patio area for our group. As soon as we arrived they got us seated and started serving lunch.

After lunch we spent a bit of time looking around the grounds of the grand old house. It had been originally built as a boarding house in 1891, but had been converted to a







home for John Oughton. Eventually, in 1965, Oughton's grandson had converted the building into the restaurant. In addition to groups like ours it also does other events like weddings and graduations.



After everyone had eaten and taken some time to tour the grounds, we were back in the cars and back on our way. This time to the Ambler/Becker Texaco station, which was also in Dwight on North Franklin Street.

We rolled up on the Texaco Station a few minutes later and everyone got out to look around. Once everyone got there, I got them all to line up and wave for a group photo.



While we were enjoying this stop, the weather began to look really threatening. So, although there was actually one more stop planned, most of the participants made a bee line back for Pontiac after this stop.

Everyone that went on the cruise had a really great time. I can't wait to see what they line up for us in 2015.





Ground Rules for Eligible Cars:

- Factory parts, such as the sports appearance package and 18 inch wheels, are allowed.
- All parts the car was originally supplied with, such as the spoiler, must be installed. (Exception: Parts removed to install other factory parts such as the sports appearance package or 18" wheels.)

Once the cars are identified, a photo session will be scheduled.
